Julia Ward Howe, an American writer, lecturer, and Reformer born in 1819, first suggested that a day be set aside to honor Mothers. She suggested that it be observed on June 2, as a day dedicated to peace. President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution in Congress on May 9, 1914, recommending that the federal government observe Mother's Day. The next year, the president was authorized to proclaim an annual holiday.

THE BEAUTIFUL BIRDBATH

One of the most frequently asked questions at Wilshire Garden Market is how to keep birdbaths sparkling clean.

Use a firm kitchen vegetable brush to rub out dirt and algae under a running hose. Or, use a wet cloth dipped in sand as an abrasive.

A chemical solution of one part bleach to ten parts water used once every two months will kill microbes. Wilshire Garden Market stocks a bio-enzymatic solution that prevents the development of organic contaminants.

Birds prefer a shallow birdbath, no more than three inches deep in the center. Add rocks or a low, flat object upon which they can stand as they bathe.

A fountain with the sound of moving water will attract a variety of species; hummingbirds bathe in flight.

Birds must have clean water, which sometimes can be difficult to find. Adding a birdbath or two to your garden is a kindness to the birds, and beautifies your garden as well.

Other helpful birdbath tips:

- Place the birdbath in the shade to keep the water cool.
- Place the birdbath in an area where cats can not lurk and close to trees or shrubs where the birds can escape if they feel threatened.
- Place the birdbath in easy reach of the garden hose.
- Place the birdbath where it is visible from indoors.

STAMP OUT CRAPE MURDER

One of the greatest abuses and improper forms of pruning is a malpractice referred to as “topping”. It is the uneducated butchering of trees. Too often, unwitting homeowners pay hundreds of dollars to have their trees butchered. The poor pruning of the crape myrtle (*Lagerstroemia indica*) is referred to by many horticulturists as “crape murder”.



Although the butchered crape myrtle cannot be restored to its natural branch habit, improvements can be made to enhance its health and appearance. A certified arborist will know how to “un-

top” it. At the site of the butchering cuts, numerous broom like “water sprouts” will grow, instead of real branches. Besides being an unattractive mass of growth, they will be much weaker than true branches and will tear off in storms.

If the tree is small enough, the homeowner could attempt to repair a crape myrtle that has been topped, as follows:

Using proper branch collar cuts, thin the water-sprouts out from five or six down to two or three. Choose those that have the widest (those are the strongest) angles from the main branch. Not “topping” for several years will help, but the scars will always be visible to the trained eye. The crape myrtle’s contribution to the landscape will be at least partially restored.

Misguided tree butchers usually give two reasons for topping crape myrtles yearly. The first wrong reason is that dead flowers have to be cut off to promote flowering for next year. Not true! Any crape myrtle that has been allowed to grow correctly will have plenty of blooms. The second reason given is that the tree will get too large. If you choose the wrong variety for the wrong location it will be too large. Choosing the correct plant for the correct location eliminates the need to butcher; there are dozens of cultivars.

Well trained arborists say “A properly pruned tree doesn’t look pruned. A topped tree does.”

COOL NIGHTS, BRILLIANT COLORS

Traveling to the Santa Fe, New Mexico area makes some gardeners wonder why the colors of blue flowers are so intensely blue there and not in Oklahoma. At last we have the answer. Flower petals have pigments in them that respond to temperature. Certain enzymes in plant cells make the pigment during the day. This pigment is very heat sensitive. If temperatures cool down at night, the pigments endure; if temperatures do not cool down at night, the pigments break down to be re-formed the next day.

Blue and red flowers seem quite brilliant in high altitudes; yellow flowers are bright no matter where they grow. Yellow pigments are not heat sensitive. Marigolds, sunflowers, and coreopsis are as beautiful in Oklahoma as they are in Colorado or New Mexico. Thankfully, many flowers will take the Oklahoma heat if they are planted in the correct location.

MARJORIE MILLER’S FLOWERS

In her April 23 slide presentation, *Color in the Garden from March through November*, Marjorie Miller provided attendees with a lengthy list of her favorite plants for the Oklahoma climate. Since the varieties bloom at different times, with judicious selection a gardener can have color over an extended period. Her favorites included:
